Keynote & Plenary Speaker

Olga R. Trujillo, JD
Olga Trujillo Consulting

Olga Trujillo is a survivor of child sexual abuse who has undertaken a journey to understand the impact violence has had on her life – from the domestic violence she witnessed as a child to the sexual violence she suffered as a child to the rapes she endured as an adult.

Ms. Trujillo is also a consultant and an attorney. After nearly 13 years with the US Dept. of Justice, Ms. Trujillo started her own practice to work on sexual assault, domestic violence and child abuse issues. While at the Dept. of Justice, she served as the Director of the Special Projects Division of the Office for Victims of Crime and managed an \$8M discretionary grant program focusing on nationwide training and technical assistance on victim issues, including sexual assault, child abuse, domestic violence, trafficking and immigrant victims. Prior to that, Ms. Trujillo was the Legal Counsel in the Office for Victims of Crime where she helped guide the Office's many grant programs and oversaw statutory changes. Ms. Trujillo was also the General Counsel of the Office of Justice Programs and led the agency implementation of the Omnibus Crime Control Act of 1994, including the implementation of the Violence Against Women Act and various immigration provisions.

Ms. Trujillo's rare combination of personal experience and professional skills compelled her to create O.R.T. Solutions in 2001. O.R.T.'s mission is to help provide comprehensive, thought-provoking and innovative approaches to child abuse, domestic violence, sexual assault, immigration and human trafficking issues.

M. Elizabeth Ralston, PhD

M. Elizabeth Ralston, Ph.D. is the founding director of the Dee Norton Lowcountry Children's Center, Inc (DNLCC), an accredited Children's Advocacy Center located in Charleston, SC. Dr. Ralston is on the clinical faculty of the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Science at the Medical University of South Carolina. She serves on the Board of Directors of the National Children's Alliance and received the Bud Cramer Award from NCA in 2005. She is active with the National Child Traumatic Stress Network Child Welfare committee and helped develop the CAC Directors Mental Health Guide. In 2009, DNLCC was designated as a Level III Center within the National Child Traumatic Stress Network and is currently coordinating a community based learning collaborative to implement evidence supported treatment for children with sexual behavior problems.

Dr. Ralston is the co-director of Project BEST, a community based learning collaborative coordinated through Children's Advocacy Centers and funded by The Duke Endowment. The goal of Project Best is to increase the availability of evidence based treatment to the children of South Carolina by training community mental health professionals in the delivery of Trauma Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy and training community treatment brokers to do evidence based treatment planning and case management. Dr. Ralston provides training, consultation, expert testimony and technical assistance regarding child maltreatment at the state, national and international level.

Lt. Michael J. Prodan

Criminal Investigative Profiler, South Carolina Law Enforcement Division

Lt. Michael J. Prodan has 36 years of law enforcement experience with over 24 years of investigating violent crime. He is qualified as an expert witness in violent crime scene analysis and criminal sexual behavior in numerous states.

Lt. Prodan is one of only 34 graduates worldwide of the FBI's Police Fellowship in Criminal Investigative Profiling and Crime Scene Analysis at the National Center for the Analysis of Violent Crime. He has also attended training with the United States Secret Service at their National Threat Assessment Center in Washington, D.C.

Lt. Prodan is an adjunct instructor at both the South Carolina and North Carolina Criminal Justice Training Centers. He currently offers courses of instruction on violent crime analysis and investigation, threat assessment and interrogation, all with an offender behavioral analysis perspective.

The standard of proof required by the criminal justice system is proof beyond a reasonable doubt. It is essential to a successful prosecution of a child sexual abuse case that law enforcement officers who investigate sex crimes against children work closely with prosecutors who take the cases to court. A productive working relationship between these “separate but equal” partners in the war on crimes against children is essential to a successful case outcome. This workshop will examine the components of a legally defensible child sexual abuse investigation. The most successful defense strategies are those that take the focus off the child victim and place it on the investigator, the investigation or both. This workshop will explore those strategies and offer tips on how to meet and defeat common defenses in child sexual abuse prosecutions.

R. When the Child's Credibility is in Doubt: Interview Strategies to Respond to Recantation and to Elicit Investigative Leads

It is necessary in conducting forensic interviews to understand how to use the child interview in developing investigative leads in order to refute or corroborate the child's statement. It is not uncommon for a child to recant his or her disclosure during the investigation process, raising issues of the child's credibility. T. Critical Issues in the Investigation & Prosecution of Abusive Head Trauma, Part 1 of 2

This presentation will focus on the spectrum of challenges facing the investigation/prosecution of cases involving abusive head trauma, principally those resulting from diagnosis of shaken baby syndrome and/or shaken impact syndrome. The presentation will highlight: (1) the types of false defenses frequently encountered in these cases, with a view toward how key investigative protocols/prosecutorial strategies can overcome them; (2) the need for appropriate crime scene investigation and interview strategies for suspects and witnesses to refute these defense theories; (3) the use of crime scene reenactments and video demonstrations by suspects of the mechanism producing the injuries and the forces involved as a foundation for expert medical opinion

testimony by the prosecution's experts and as a means of challenging defense expert testimony; and (4) the increasingly complex nature of medical technology and literature in the field, and the need for prosecutors, investigators and fact finders to understand the mechanisms for, and consequences of, the critical injuries children suffer in these cases.
