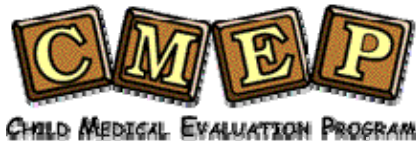

This effort recognized the needs of the National Children's Alliance, the Child Abuse Section of the American Academy of Pediatrics and the National Association of Children's Hospitals and Related Institutes. This commitment resulted in the evidence-based publication: **Guidelines for Medical Care of Children who may have been Sexually Abused** in the *Journal of Pediatric and Adolescent Gynecology* in 2007, which was recently updated. Examples of the controversy and the process will be discussed.
